

HOWDY, I'M ...



Next month's primary election of Tennessee's state legislators will prove interesting for VECAA residents. A total of ten candidates have qualified for races in the 89th and 98th districts. All of the candidates are under 50, six are black, one is a Republican and one is a woman.

District 89

Twenty-eight-year-old PAM GAIA of 1080 Poplar holds the distinction of being the only woman in the race. However, she feels that she knows the needs of the entire community. She worked with the last General Assembly to pass a comprehensive bill to aid senior citizens, but it was defeated. If elected she promises to work for its passage, as well as to promote a bill to increase student aid based on tuition. A student at Memphis State who will soon receive her B.A. in psychology, Pam also has background experience in merchandising.

Pam, who is white, believes that race relations are a primary asset to the V/E area. She states that she would work to enact model legislation to help integrated communities.

She attends Little Flower Church and is single. Her campaign phone number is 526-4882. As a Democrat she has served as a delegate to the State and county Democratic convention and believes she has gotten to know the people.

BOB HAWKS is no stranger to State politics. As a Democrat, he served three terms representing District 97 from 1966 to 1972. Bob has been both a businessman and a labor union official. He feels this has given his a chance to know both sides of the working man's problem. He graduated from Treadwell High School and is now a licensed financial and real estate consultant. Bob promises to work for tax exemptions for senior citizens and a mechanics lien law. He also would like to help obtain a 24-hour neighborhood health clinic and

to ease the drainage problems of Cypress Creek.

Bob, who is 47, attends Leawood Baptist Church and has three children. His campaign headquarters is at 1693 Jackson and the phone number is 458-4441. He lives at 1460 Jackson and is white. Bob promises to represent the constituency as a whole and welcomes all inquiries.

DON ROBBINS of 919 N. McLean has a wide range of business and educational experience for his 27 years. A Democrat, he is the president of two wholesale food processing corporations. He received a B.A. from Lambuth and an M.B.A. from the University of Tennessee where he is eighteen hours away from a Ph.D. in business.

As a businessman, he believes he can intelligently represent the community. He states that he has the time to devote to the job and that he particularly understands what it takes to live in a spiraling economy. He would like to remove the sales tax from prescription drugs for senior citizens. Don would also like to require that everyone obtain liability insurance before receiving a new driver's license.

Don, who is white, has one daughter and attends Lindsay Memorial Presbyterian Church. His campaign phone is 272-7091.

HENRY RAZOR is the only black running in District 89 and feels he is particularly knowledgable about the total needs of our community. He has served as the administrative assistant to the State Democrats in Nashville. Before that he spent six years working as a salesman in the area. He feels he knows many people personally and that they trust him.

Henry received a degree in political science from the University of Illinois at Carbondale. He has also studied business and language in Germany. Education is a top priority to Henry. He believes we must first raise teacher salaries and instill a positive attitude including parental support in our schools.

Fighting for the Equal Right Amendment as an administrative assistant, Henry believes it should be passed again. He also promises to open a Memphis office to prevent communications breakdown.

District 98

NORMAL TIMOTHY HENDERSON is a black Democrat, as are all of the candidates from District 98. He is 28 and lives at 1052 Michelle Circle. Normal attended a local high school and is now getting a graduate degree in criminal justice from Tennessee State University where he completed his undergraduate training.

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mal feels that he understands some of the community's problems. He is currently a member of the Klondike Civic Club. Normal would most like to work for tax exemptions for the small businessman. He also believes the State could contribute funds to improve Cypress Creek. Normal has three children and attends Mt. WILLIE HENRY, Jr., is a social advocate at the Holy Names Parish, of which he is a member. He was educated in theology at LeMoyne-Owen College and Memphis State University. He also studied nutrition at the University of Tennessee.

Willie, who lives at 1021 Pearce #4, has been active in civic affairs. He is a member of the Tennessee Survival Conference, Project First Offender and the Catholic Charities of Memphis. He also participated in the NAACP Committee on Police Justice and Penal Reform which Willie believes should include job training and counseling. Without education, he feels, the cycle of crime will not be broken. Willie is 24 and married. Inquiries may be directed to 525-2972.

WARREN LEWIS, Sr., is also concerned with penal reform. He is a former juvenile probation officer who is currently involved in meeting the "everyday needs of people." A hairstylist by profession, Warren is an advisor to City Hall's Youth Employment Service. He helped to organize the Black Knights, a black service organization, and the Emergency Assistance Bank. He believes that his knowledge could redirect the system to meet needs that are currently unfulfilled. He would like to strengthen programs to provide emergency shelter and assistance.

Warren, who is 41, lives at 2194 Vollintine and has three children. He graduated from a Mississippi high school and attends Pentecostal Temple where he is a drummer in the choir. His campaign headquarters is at 887 Thomas and his phone is 527-7771.

JERRY WYATT of 715 Marble Apt. C could not be reached for comment. His phone is listed as 525-1256.

In the V/E community District 89 includes precincts, 36-l, 36-2, 36-3 and parts of 20-l and 20-2. The incumbent is Republican Doy Daniels, Jr., of 775 Pope who was featured along with 98th District Representative Harper Brewer in last month's Evergreen News. Harper is a Democrat and lives at 990 N. Idlewild. District 98 includes the V/E area north of Vollintine, precinct 41-2 and part of precinct 40-2.

Welcome to JOHN and SANDRA FOX who came recently to 1957 Jackson with their son, JASON, who

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

IJn-Rezoned

On July 3 a petition was presented to the Planning Commission requesting that the property at the northwest corner of Vollintine and Garland be rezoned from R-3 (residential) to C-1 (commercial). VECAA and nearby residents felt that spot zoning of this vacant lot would detract from the neighborhood and that the petition should be opposed.

GEORGE BROWN, Jr., of 1030 Monticello Drive represented the opponents and won the case handily, with the Commission voting unanimously against rezoning. The hearing before the Commission is the first step in a process that takes the case to the City Council at a later date. It is hoped that the Council will support the community's efforts toward maintaining its residential character.

Scenic Drives

The City Council recently voted for an ordinance allowing for the creation of "scenic drives" throughout Memphis. The intent of the ordinance is to maintain existing residential areas in the face of increasing pressure for office, commercial and industrial uses by preventing rezoning to non-residential usage in the designated areas.

The V/E community was fortunate in having several streets included. Of the twenty-one streets designated, three were in our neighborhood. These were McLean Blvd. (from North Parkway to Poplar), North Parkway (from Dunlap to East Parkway) and Trezevant (from Jackson to North Parkway). At a later meeting the ordinance was amended to include Jackson Avenue from Evergreen to Trezevant.

Provision has been made for the designation of additional streets and VECAA is presently petitioning the Council to include other neighborhood thoroughfares. Among others, it is hoped that parts of Vollintine, McLean (not included above) and Evergreen might be added.
