We are fortunate to have in our area a number of musicians whose abilities are as diversified as the neighborhood itself. Many of these people are connected with Southwestern in one way or another while others are commercial performers or perform strictly for their own entertainment.

One of the foremost musicians in the community is CHARLES MOSBY of 1869 S Rainbow Circle. Prof. Mosby is chairman of the music department at Southwestern as well as a taiented performer. His formal education began in piano atthat eolleqe who he roceived his bacheto 's dexreein music (and wrot the sebon pep somb). fo oannot a master's degree from lorida state dad has done posi-w eduate work at the tr anversity of Chicago.

CHARLOTTE MCLAIN of 1973 Snowden is another noteworthy member of the Southwestern faculty. She teaches organ, harpsichord, piano and music history. Ms. MeLain's interest in music goes back to when she was four years old. It was during World War II and she wanted a toy. As few were available her mother bought her a real accordian. Lessons came free with the instrument and her career in music began.

Prof. McLain completed her undergraduate work at the University of Indiana, specializing in organ. Her graduate work was completed at Peabody College in Nashville. She and her husband MIC ILAEL have lived in Memphis for the last eight years.

TONY GARNER of 521 Hawthorne has been an instructor al Southwestern for nime years. He conducts music for a variety of organizations in the city including the Southwestern Singers, the Southwestern Orchestra, Memphis Opera Theatre, Theatre Memphis and the Evergreen Presbyterian Church choir

Prof. Garner has a degree in church music from Southwestern and studied for five seasons under Isaac VanGrove. In December he will receive his M.A. degree in music history from Memphis State. He and his wife BETTE have recently returned from a tour of Rumania with the Southwestern Singers.

Chief among commercial artists in the neighborhood is LEO LeBLANC of 405 N . Avalon. Leo plays steel guitar and has quite a few contemporary credits to his name. He has recorded an album for RCA Records and has a single to be released soon. He has provided accompaniment on records for such notable artists as Mac Davis, Liza Minelli, the Osmond Brothers, Tony Joe White and the Gentrys.

Another real performer is singer-guitarist SID SE LVIDGE of 1694 Autumn. Formerly an anthropology instructor at Southwestern, Sid is now a full-time musician. He has recently released a song called "Portrait" on the Enterprise label and has a new album, "Cold of the Morning", coming out this month.

One of those neighborhood residents who plays for fun is DINO PACCASASSI of 1868 S. Rainbow Circle. # Revised Riders' Guide 

Three years ago the News printed an article on the Memphis Transit Authority but routes serving the Vollintine/Ever green community. Recently revisions have been made in both routing and scheduling that neighborhood residents should know about. Refer to the map below in reading the following comments.

Of the eight routes running through the community, seven will remain inservice after the Nov. 14 changeover date. The eliminated route is the Jackson Express which operated during rush hours. This loss will be compensated for through improvements on the 52 Jackson route. The 3 Summer route remains unchanged through the neighborhood although the 3 Summer-Treadwell route has been redesignated as SummerMacon. There have been no changes in the 19 Vollintine and the 53 Jackson routes. The 40 Raleigh route remains the same
through the neighborhood although it now serves Frayser. The only other east-west route, the Summer Express, has been redesignated the Summer Blazer; its stops between Watkins and Trezevant are being reduced from five to three or less.

The only north-south route, 31 Crosstown, remains the same. There is still the possibility that a McLean route will be added sometime in the future.

The schedules remain very much the same although the 40 Raleigh bus will run every 45 minutes instead of 25 and the 52 Jackson-Macon will run every 30 minutes on Saturday rather than every 45.

According to DON BURGESS, Superintendent of Schedules, new improved route maps should be available by Nov. 10. The changes will go into effect on Nov. 14. Be sure to consult the transit authority for specific times and routes.

With authentic, rustic, cheerful, informal Southern cafe atmosphere, the Service Cafe on Jackson is one of the few places leftin Memphis to get a good old American-style break fast. (It opens, by the way, at 6:30 a.m.) This consists of one egg, bacon, ham or sausage, grits, toast and coffee for $\$ 1$. ( $\$ 1.20$ will get you two eggs with juice, sweetrolls and hotcakes also moderately priced.) As a breakfast hangout it is ideal because the food is well prepared and plentiful, the price is right, the enstomers friendly, and the proprietor, chef, and waitresses eager to please.

The proprictor since Mareh, 1960, has been GEORGE J. VERCOS of the Memphis restauranteer family. Prior to the purchase of the service Cate, George and his brother CHARLES (owner of the downown "Rembems's ran the dackson Coffor

All lunches and dianers (meat with throe vegetables) cost $\$ 1.70$, with dessert $35 ¢$ extra and coffee (strong) 20\&. If preferred, dessert can be substituted for one vegetable at the same price. A vegetable plate (three vegetables) runs $\$ 1.25$.

From the main course meat dishes, try either the barbecued lamb neeks or the braised beef tips in gravy. Be sure to request the large, serumptious homemade rolls. Dessert is a specialty at the Service, as the chef, SIE HENRY WALKER, serves delicious homemade puddings (banana, bread with fruit, and rice) as well as homemade cobblers. The Cafe also features excellentservice with its lop-of-the-line waitresses, MABLE SULLIVAN (30-year veteran), VONNIE VIR-

GIE, SHIRLEY SHAW and FRANCES FORSYTHE.

The Service Cafe is located at 1422 Jackson Avenue with ample parking available. Hours are from 6:30 a. m. to 8:30 p.m., Monday through Saturday.
