VECA SURVEYS RIGHT-OF-WAY NEIGHBORS

Greenbelt or property extension? These are two questions VECA members will be asking property owners whose land adjoins the old Louisville & Nashville Railroad right-of-way in their door-to-door survey this month. If you live along the right-of-way, the 15 minutes it takes to answer the survey questions may be the most important ones you'll ever spend concerning your property value.

Survey findings will be fed into a computer and tallied for discussion at the next VECA general membership meeting May 23 at 7:30 p.m. at Lindsay

Memorial Presbyterian Church.

Mike Kirby, VECA member and survey coordinator, said about 200 property owners will be surveyed on what they think should be done with the abandoned L & N right-of-way, which runs from west of Hollywood near the Wolf River to downtown's Front Street, passing by the northern edge of the Southwestern campus.

At past VECA meetings, some members have expressed interest in turning the stretch through our neighborhood into a greenbelt, possibly with a bicycling and jogging path. Homeowners have also

asked about extending their property lines.
"We're going to be finding out what the neighbors along the right-of-way want," said Kirby. "It wouldn't make much sense to exert a lot of effort in this area and not have a clear consensus of what the people closest to it want."

"We'll also be asking homeowners if they've had any maintenance problems with the right-ofway," Kirby said. L & N has the responsibility of

VECA has awarded its first "Friend of VECA" award to Mark Hackett, executive assistant to the mayor and director of the Mayor's Action Center. The plaque was presented to Hackett at the March

28 general membership meeting.

VECA president Dennis Heitzmann said Hackett has given the neighborhood group help far beyond what was required of Hackett's job position. He initiated action and gave support to several neighborhood clean-up problems. Hackett handles all city service complaints from pot holes to garbage pickup and makes frequent speaking engagements to neighborhood organizations.

In other VECA matters, by publication of this article, VECA will have elected a new president at its March general membership meeting. Dennis Heitzmann has been president for two years. More on this

Also, discussed in the VECA executive committee meeting of March 15 was the possibility of neighborhood businesses and VECA sharing in the purchase of concrete trash receptacles offered by City Beautiful to be placed in front of businesses. Ann Moore is contacting businesses for reaction on this.

Dennis Heitzmann reported he wrote a letter for VECA, per County Commissioner Julian Bolton's request, supporting the preservation of the abandoned MATA bus barns. The next VECA executive committee meeting is April 19 at 1663 Tutwiler. (Minute notes submitted by Franklin Moore.)

Even when survey questions are tallied, there are still many questions left unanswered which will require VECA's attention: questions like property and title ownership, and where the money would come from to fulfill any plans like a greenbelt. To VECA's credit, several politicians are exploring some of these questions. At a recent meeting, State Sen. Steve Cohen, vice-chairman of the State Senate Transportation Committee, State Rep. Pam Gaia and Janet Park, the city's new neighborhood liaison, offered their assistance.
