#### **BIMONTHLY MEETING**

The VECA meeting was held May 3rd at Lindsay Memorial Presbyterian Church. Herbert Van Tol of the Mid-South Peace and Justice Center presented a program on the Shelby County Community Reinvestment Coalition. The Coalition formed in 1985 to monitor the loan practices of area banks. The Community Reinvestment Act of 1977 is the law which the Coalition uses to work with Memphis banks. The Coalition holds regular meetings with the banks and the Coalition membership. The main function of the organization is to insure all areas of the city are accorded the same loan opportunities. One of the keys to maintaining or rehabilitating a community is available dollars for physical improvement of properties. If you have questions about a banks loan history in a particular area or want more information about the coalition call 452-6997.

#### HOUSING COMMITTEE

The Housing Committee continues its work on the restoration area. Additional surveys were done on Willett, Stonewall, Jackson and Faxon. Several properties have been identified as problems and have been submitted to the city for code enforcement action.

A compliment is due to Gary Kirk and his staff at the Department of Housing Improvement. Housing Inspector Henry Bungard contacted VECA and offered assistance after reading in the Evergreen News

about problem houses in the restoration area. Hopefully, VECA and Housing Improvement can work effectively to eliminate these problems. Bungard indicated that one of the problem owners on Dickinson has been cited. VECA was pressing for a citation on a second house.

Steve Shular of the Mayor's Action Center will be joining members of the Housing Committee to visually inspect the remaining streets in the restoration area which includes Tutwiler, Snowden, and Lyndale between Stonewall and Watkins.

The Housing Committee has been following the developments on the property at 1912 Jackson. There have been only minimal improvements on the property. In the meantime there has been a steady stream of complaints to the city, including several complaints by the VECA Housing Committee. The Committee was shocked to find that the owner has been given until July to pay the fine that was assessed in the fall.

Harper Brewer, a VECA resident, has a ninety day option to buy the property at 1912 Jackson. There was no more information at the time of the Evergreen News going to press.



#### REMOVING NEIGHBORHOOD CHILDREN

The Board proposed redrawing district lines to make room for optional transfers in an "overcrowded" school. This school was Vollentine Optional. By Shifting our VECA students to an "underused" school, Klondyke without exploring the reason for overcrowding and under use, our community was losing one of its best assets, Vollentine school. In many cases people have moved into our area seeking good schools and a solid neighborhood. Such actions as the Board's would do harm to our community's integrity.

On April 21st the Board notified 175 students that they would be transferred to Klondyke. Changing the Vollentine school district without consulting either the parents directly affected or VECA, was a disregard for the effects of such changes on the community. VECA is a friend of the court in the standing desegregation plan and should be consulted when any school redistricting is proposed for our community. If the Board had consulted with the community and its association (VECA) in preparing its plan, we could have familiarized them with long-standing abuses of the residence requirement policy that has caused an exodus from Cypress and Klondyke and an apparent overcrowding at Vollentine and Snowden. The timing of the transfers and change in district lines was after the deadline for these children to apply for an opening in an Optional school. The School policy on Optional schools in regards to enrollment is not clear. At some Optional schools children have been told that once they are in the Optional program they may remain in that program as long they are age appropriate for the program. This applies even if they move out of the Optional school district. This rule was not being applied to 175 students who were to be transferred from Vollentine.

On June 2nd community residents Peggy Bently, Janice Cannon, and Julie Borys, VECA president, met

with Rev. Hubon Sandridge and Dr. J.C. Williams of the Board and Dr. Johnny Watson of school administration to discuss the planned redistricting. Larry Mclellan of Center for Neighborhoods attended the meeting in support of the VECA community. At the meeting the board members and school administration agreed to delay the district change for one year and to meet with area residents and school administrators to come up with a plan that would address the issue of overcrowding and keep the interests of the community in mind.

The School Board met June 5th and reviewed and approved the proposed one year delay and formation of the study group. The School Board also committed to the building of six new classrooms at Vollentine. If you have questions or would like to work with the education Committee, call Julie at 272-2672.

### CITY GOVERNMENT AND HOUSING COMPLAINTS By Mike Kirby

If your neighbor is not maintaining his home and it has implications for your entire neighborhood, there is a legal mechanism which you can use to obtain city action. It is called the city code, and it starts with a call to the Mayor's Action Center.

As an informed city resident, you can use this mechanism to protect your street and neighborhood from careless owners and residents.

This issue of the Evergreen News will begin a series of articles which describe the code and how to use it effectively. This issue will discuss how a complaint can be filed.

The Mayor's Action Center is the beginning point of any complaint. When it receives a complaint, the Mayor's Action Center sends a computerized form to one of the city or county agencies which is respon-

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sible for the area. For example, a housing problem goes to the Department of Housing Improvement, a high weeds complaint goes to the City Beautiful Commission or the Health Department, and a hole in the street goes to Public Works. Once the agency responds to the complaint, it tells the Mayor's Action Center what has been accomplished. That information is then communicated back to the resident who originally complained.

The problem with this system is that the individual agencies receive thousands of complaints, and they may not be impressed with the need to satisfy each one. Further, the Mayor's Action Center cannot individually verify the information. If it is told by an agency that a complaint is closed, i.e. the problem solved, that information is forwarded to the citizen, whether the problem has been alleviated or not.

In order for this system to work effectively for you, the VECA neighbor, IT IS NECESSARY TO BE EXCEEDINGLY PERSISTENT. Weekly calls should be made to the Mayor's Action Center asking about the status of the complaint. Be polite. DO NOT ASSUME THE COMPLAINT WILL BE HANDLED TO YOUR SATISFACTION. If the problem is not solved, the Mayor's Action Center should be given the information so they can communicate with the agency in a more informed way.

The phone number of the Mayor's Action Center is 576-6500. The director is Steve Shular, a tireless worker, who has helped VECA on many occasions in solving housing problems. If the Mayor's Action Center cannot help solve the problem, call VECA at 276-1066.

### LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE

The best landscape is doomed to fail it its plants are not properly maintained. Maintenance involves

### CORRECT watering and weeding. Keys to being a good waterer

Most plants die from incorrect watering. As a general rule, trees and shrubs need one inch of water per week throughout the growing season. Overwatering will kill a plant as quickly as underwatering. When you do water, make sure you water thoroughly and deeply. Plants do not care if water comes as rain or irrigation water. Evergreens may need water during a dry and windy day.

Stick you finger into the soil. Water if it feels dry. Do not water if it feels moist or wet. A moisture meter is not a substitute for your finger, and no mechanical device is superior to a human's sensitivity to nature.

Water slowly to insure that water soaks deep into the ground (2 to 8 inches). One long and thorough watering is superior to multiple brief watering. Deep watering leads to deep rooting which makes plants more cold and drought tolerant.

### Keys to weeding

Any plant growing in a location where you do not want it is a weed. All newly planted beds have some weeds. This is normal and to be expected. There are several ways to control weeds. Pulling them by hand is the most popular, the most labor intensive, and the least successful. Pre-emergents or seed killers kill the weed prior to emerging as a green and growing plant. Non-selective herbicides kill whatever they are sprayed onto. Selective herbicides kill some plants while doing nothing to others. The best weed control is a combination of all of the above approaches.

Apply pre-emergents to shrub beds every 3-5 months for the first year and once yearly (early in March) every year thereafter. (Eptam, Treflan, Dachhal, Rout,

Spot spray just the weeds with a non-selective herbicide one time per month during the growing season. This should take just a few minutes and is best done with a Windex-like hand-held squirt bottle. A 3x3 sheet of cardboard can serve as a shield to guard against spraying any chemical on a desirable plant. (Roundup, Cleanup, Kilzall, etc.)

Grasses in beds of monkey grass and other ground covers or shrub beds are easily controlled with selective herbicides. (Poast, fusilad, etc.)

Finally, if any weed or grass is still alive then it should be hand weeded and thrown away.
