
Our VECA area homes have had stockings hung from the mantle with care for over 65 years in this historic area, and mistletoe dan-

VECA's Heritage Day a Success

Heritage Day was part of the on going process VECA is undertaking to get VECA placed on the National Register of Historic Places. NEIGHBORHOOD FOCUS

Saint John Orthodox Church

Although Christmas is several weeks away, Orthodox Christians began their spiritual preparations for this holy day on November 15, the first day of the Christmas Fast.

In the Orthodox tradition, Christmas, like Easter, is preceded by a forty-day period of fasting and spiritual preparation. In fact, the Christmas Fast is often called the Little Lent. It is less stringent than Great Lent, but is still a serious time of prayer, fasting, almsgiving, and increased devotion to the coming Savior.

The Christmas Fast parallels Advent, which is observed in many Western churches beginning four Sundays before Christmas.

Christmas celebrations do not properly begin for Orthodox Christians until Christmas day, when the season of preparation has been completed and the Lord has come. Christmas is then celebrated for twelve full days, from Christmas day until Epiphany, on January 6.

St. John Orthodox Church, 1663 Tutwiler, celebrates the Feast of the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ at a Vesperal Liturgy at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, December 24. Festivities begin before the liturgy at 6 p.m. with a children's play, "Christmas, the Pageant." The play includes 35 children ages 4 to 12. Following the liturgy, a holiday dinner will be shared by all.

The Nativity of our Lord, or Christmas, is one of the Twelve Great Feasts of the Orthodox Church. It was first celebrated in the fourth century, when the Church decided to overcome the pagan festival of the Invincible Sun with its own celebration. Thus the traditional Orthodox hymns for Christmas call for the worship of the true Sun of Righteousness, who is Himself worshipped by all of His Creation.

Landmarks Commission Under Review

The Memphis Landmarks Commission, which is Memphis' local historical commission, is under review by City Council. There are concerns that the Commission has too much control over small neighborhoods and stands in the way of development. Good development does not occur in a vacuum. Urban renewal of the 60's was shown to be a disastrous policy. That is the wholesale removal of old neighborhoods and commercial areas and the replacement with new development. Witness the success of urban renewal in Memphis south of Mid America Mall on both

sides of Beale. This pasture land in downtown Memphis has certainly added to the stabilization and development of our downtown. Successful development of urban areas has been linked to an integrated approach to planning that takes in account environmental concerns, preservation of cultural and architectural features, existing neighborhood patterns, and new development. Memphis needs a strong Landmarks Commission to work with city leaders in planning, developing and maintaining a diverse, interesting and economi-

cally feasible community for all income groups. Please contact your council person and discuss the Landmarks Commission with them.

Monitor the paper for council meetings. Attend and show your support for the idea of a staffed commission and need for comprehensive planning that takes in all aspects of a community including its historical heritage. It appears City Council will try to take action during the Christmas holidays on the Land-

marks Commission and on Central Gardens request for local district status. Don't let City Council give VECA a Christmas present we didn't ask for. Voice your opinion. Jack Sammons has been in support of the Landmarks Commission and needs to hear from you. Kenneth Whalum is conservative on the issue and not sure how a Landmarks Commission benefits moderate income areas like VECA. Let the council know how you feel about having a Landmarks Commission.

Get Your Home Ready for the Big Chill

The last two mild winters may have left us a little lackadasical in our winter house prepara-

tion. Taking a little time now may well prevent frozen or burst pipes when the temperatures dip below freezing.

The most protective measure would be to ensure that all foundation and attic vents are closed _ tightly. During the cold get weather

tightly. During the coldest weather, when the temperature dips below 20 degrees, it is wise to turn your thermostat up a few degrees to get more warmth to the coolest areas of the house. Doors to kitchen sinks and lavatories should

be opened if they are on outside walls.

Should a pipe freeze, despite your precautions, be sure your water is turned off before you leave

home. Pipes burst when they freeze, not when they thaw. If your water is left on it can flood the house quickly. And, call your plumber. Calls are taken

on a first come basis. Remember, in the worst winter freezes, when the temperatures drop below 0 degree for an extended period, it is not unusual for a plumbing company to have a two week backlog of calls.


