The very first Vollintine-Evergreen Historic District Home Tour will take place on Sunday October 20, 1996 from 12:30 to 5:00. All-inclusive tickets will be just \$8. The tour will give us a chance to show Memphis how great our neighborhood is and to exhibit the different kinds of houses we have. For this year's tour, we are clustering houses near the Jackson-University intersection so walking will be easy.

There will be five houses and one church on the tour, plus antique cars from the 1920s. Tickets and refreshments will be available at the central point of the tour, the Church of the Good Shepherd at 1971 Jackson Avenue. The tour consists of the Oakmont Bungalow of John and Claudia Rutkaukaus, the Hallwood Tudor of Bette Ackerman and Henry Kurtz, the Hallwood Colonial Gambrel of David and Brenda Jeter, the Jackson Tudor of Chuck Dille and Randall Paxton, and the Kensington Bungalow of Dell Stiner. Tickets will also be available at the VECA office prior to the tour.

On July 23, at a gathering of VECA Greenway Committee members, neighbors and passersby, we had a little champagne, took a lot of pictures, christened a concrete traffic-stopping "stump", and, yes, finally signed the contract! After many sometimes-frustrating years, we are finally making progress towards owning, maintaining and controlling the 1.7 mile "Urban Linear Greenspace" traversing Vollintine-Evergreen that was once a railroad bed. This contract is our offer to buy the property from CSX Railroad for \$15,000; the Railroad has 45 days to respond. As the deal is being finalized, we can plan for maintenance, future funding and possible tie-ins with other VECA committees. We have also learned that the Office of Planning and Development would like to incorporate our project into the "Community Compact" as a demonstration to other communities of projects that make a neighborhood a pleasant place to live!

FUTURE ADDITIONS TO THE HISTORIC DISTRICT

While much of the VECA neighborhood dates from the 1920s and 1930s, some areas are newer and thus weren't eligible for Historic District designation with the original application. But plans are to include these newer areas later, and much of the work has already been done.

The nomination for the area between Vollintine and Cypress Creek has been prepared and submitted to the Tennessee Historical Commission for review. This area is divided into two sections, Avalon and Colonial. When the nomination is complete both areas will be referred to as the Vollintine Evergreen Historic District. This issue of the Vollintine-Evergreen News will outline the Colonial area nomination. The previous issue highlighted Avalon.

The Vollintine Evergreen Colonial Historic District is bounded by Vollintine on the south, McLean on the west, University on the east, and the north ends of Rainbow, Barksdale, and Sheridan on the north. The district is comprised of 283 primary and secondary structures: late 1920s and 1930s Tudor

Revival and Craftsman style homes built on streets in a grid pattern, and late 1930s and early 1940s Colonial Revival homes built on loop streets. The city's first FHA-financed home is on Rainbow Circle.

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University is the high ground of this area, sloping down and westward to Rainbow Circle and Monticello. Sheridan and Barksdale dead-end at a steep drop to the lower ground of the Cypress Creek floodplain, where houses were built after flood control measures were in place following the flood of 1937. (The previous issue of the Vollintine-Evergreen News has more on the Jadwin Plan and flood control, the Cypress Creek pumping station, etc.)

In 1938 C.M. Jacobson developed Colonial Terrace, which encompasses Rainbow Circle, Monticello, and part of Vollintine. The architect for Colonial Terrace was Polk W. Agee, a prominent architect in Memphis for decades. He chose to live on Rainbow Circle until his death in 1987.

East of Colonial Terrace are the University Terrace and North Barksdale Terrace subdivisions, developed in 1929 and 1930 by Harry Dlugach. This development runs along both sides of Sheridan north of Vollintine, and is typical of the earlier grid pattern development.

The Jewish community started moving to Colonial as soon as homes were built in the 1930s. As the Jewish population grew so did the interest in moving their place of worship to the area. The war and the European refugee situation for the Jewish community put plans on hold. But after the war, the Baron Hirsch Synagogue was built and the surrounding Vollintine Hills area was developed on the Terry Golf Course by Herman Gruber and Philip Belz Sr., prominent members of the Baron Hirsch Jewish community.

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HOW TO HANDLE A Household Emergency

Are you prepared for a household emergency? Every member of your household should be able to locate the shutoff valves and switches for your utility sources. Information on shutoff valves and switches should be in common areas where everyone can find them easily when needed. The main concerns in a household emergency situation are electricity, gas, water, and hot water tank.

Hidden from sight, the electrical system brings with it a greater potential for danger than any other system in the home. Any electrical fixture or appliance that is damaged or does not perform normally needs repair. If a switch, outlet, or fixture makes a snapping or cracking sound or if sparks, smoke, or flames are visible, immediately shut off electricity to that circuit at the service panel.

To turn off the gas to an appliance such as a stove, furnace, or water heater, find the shutoff valve for the appliance on the supply pipe where the gas enters the appliance. To turn off the gas to the entire house, use the shutoff valve on the main gas supply pipe, usually where it enters the house at the meter.

To turn off the water to a fixture such as a sink or toilet, find the shutoff value for the fixture on the supply pipe behind or underneath the fixture. For an overflowing toilet, lift the tank cover off the tank and support the float assembly with a bent coat hanger. If the fixture has no shutoff valve, turn off the water to the entire house using the shutoff valve on the main water supply pipe, usually at the water meter at the sidewalk or where it enters the house indoors.


Always remember, problems with your house will not simply go away. They will only get bigger and cost more to fix later. All work and inspections should be done by a licensed professional.

In an emergency situation be prepared — it should only take a minute to locate the shutoff valves and switches. You'll prevent further damage to your home.


