AmeriCorps NCCC helps at VECA

A team from AmeriCorps NCCC arrived in Memphis on January 14, 2010, to begin work with VECA (Vollintine-Evergreen Community Agency), the Wolf River Conservancy (WRC), and a faith-based non-profit organization called New Beginning.

The squad, which designated itself as "Delta One," did painting, patching, and carpentry at the VECA owned apartments, painted two of the VECA owned houses, and performed significant rehabilitation on the two "nasty" bathrooms at the VECA Welcome Center. They also spent three days working on the V&E Greenline at Avalon by raking and mulching leaves, landscaping, mulching trees, and restoring the trail with gravel. Three VECA residents--Mike Kirby, Chuck Fox, and Jim Doyle--worked with them on the project.

The AmeriCorp team, which has nine members, is led by Kyle Wood, a very nice young man from Vermont who is enjoying the mild Memphis weather. All their time is donated, and it has been a pleasure working with them. VECA provided supplies and supervision to the project.

The AmeriCorps NCCC Southern Region Campus out of Vicksburg, Mississippi is a full-time, team based residential program for men and women ages 18-24. NCCC members are assigned to one of five campuses and organized into teams of 10-12 members which serve in local communities. AmeriCorps focuses on five service-areas: education, disaster services, public safety, unmet human needs, and environmental conservation.



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GED and Literacy Classes at Springdale Baptist Church

Springdale Baptist Church is making a commitment to strengthening communities through education. The church provides free accredited GED and adult literacy classes on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6 to 8 p.m.

The classes are designed to assist those who did not fully succeed in the traditional classroom setting. Volunteer tutors help students of all ages work through lesson books and materials at their own pace. Because the program is based on the individual, students can miss class when life's other responsibilities take priority without falling behind.

The literacy and GED classes are based on individual drive, and each student has a different reason for pursuing his or her goal. Some decide to participate because they need a GED to be eligible for a new job or to make their current job more secure. Some want to improve their literacy for everyday life: reading bus maps and prescription bottles. Some want to achieve goals that once seemed too daunting.

Many of those in the literacy program are grandparents who want to read bedtime stories with the children they love. Home and community are important, and by educating ourselves in the present and in adulthood we can strengthen our communities.

Because unemployment and underemployment have increased during the recession more of us have the time to study and tutor, and those are great ways to invest in both our own future and that of our community.

One of the biggest challenges for Springdale Baptist Church is retaining tutors for its programs, because all of the tutors are volunteers. Buckman Labs, under the leadership of Charles Williams, now has staff members who are involved as tutors, and that has lent more long-term stability to the program and grounded it in the neighborhood.

In addition to his work with the membership and advertising committees, Bob worked closely with the V&E Greenline Committee to provide surplus gravel from the church for use on the trail.


Affordable Business Site for Rent or Sale

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MLGW Construction

Some residents of VECA have been wondering about the MLGW (Memphis Light, Gas and Water) trucks and construction they have seen in the area. We contacted Kim Deaton of MLGW, and she said that the project is scheduled for completion by the end of October 2010 in the Belvedere/Jackson/McLean area.

Deaton explained that the purpose of the construction is to replace old cast iron pipes from the gas system with new pipes made of polyethylene. She says these new pipes will provide better reli-



ability in the gas system and therefore better service for customers. The polyethylene pipes are flexible, which makes them safer in the case of an earthquake, and their flexibility will also allow for increases in gas pressure. An additional benefit of the new pipes is that they will last longer and fuse together better than the old cast iron pipes. They are being installed

by directional boring, which makes installation faster and easier.

I had talked with Mary Wilder about picking up some volunteer commitments with VECA, and she asked me to review some foundations as potential grant sources for VECA and the Greenline after the purchase of the property from the L&N Railroad successor. I doubt if those efforts produced any dollars, but the task provided a clearer understanding about the Greenline's potential for the neighborhood. I began attending Greenline meetings in the fall 2001 and participated in some initial volunteer work.

A fellow committee member taught me how to drive the tractor, and I began to do both mowing and some front end loader work on the Springs section of the Greenline east of University St. The Springs was a bit wild at this time.

Preliminary clearing had made it passable but its ditches were irregular and the area open for users was limited.

Mowing was a challenge, but it provided great stress relief from my work as a hospital chaplain. The standing joke was with cutting Greenline grass I could at least see what I had accomplished at the end of the day. With the efforts of many people through the years, the Springs was further cleared and became one of the most beautiful sections of the Greenline. Its trees, while a challenge at times because of falling limbs and toppling trunks, provide a wonderful summer canopy, and the birds, squirrels, and rabbits find it to be an attractive home.




Neighbors Make a Difference

VECA received numerous complaints from residents about graffiti-type signage at a store on Jackson Ave at Garland St.

Several VECA volunteers and residents visited the store and asked that the signage be removed because it was offensive to the neighborhood. In a spirit of neighborliness, the volunteers provided the business with a copy of the VECA newsletter and an informational brochure. However, the business chose to ignore the request, and therefore VECA filed complaints with two city agencies.

Bottom line: The sign has been painted over and is no longer a problem. VECA is working hard to develop positive relationship with businesses, but when a business crosses the line of community standards, VECA and its residents will respond.







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VECA's Annual Meeting

VECA's annual meeting for 2010 took place on January 25. About 100 people gathered at McLean Baptist Church for a potluck dinner put on by the block clubs, followed a meeting full of updates, awards and elections.

The meeting acknowledged some of VECA most dedicated supporters with four awards.

The Richard S. Borys
Award, created to recognize
public officials who contribute
to VECA through their work,
went to Lieutenant Steve Ware.
Lieutenant Ware has made
himself available at town hall
meetings and worked directly
with VECA residents on their
concerns.

The Margaret Dichtel Award went to Brad Heinz who worked on a neighborhood email alert system that has grown to an email newsletter with a circulation of 500 people. There were two Heinemann Award winners: Mike Kirby and Nedra Bailey. Kirby, who moved to Vollintine Evergreen in 1970, was honored for his work with the Greenline, the VECA newsletter and the Welcome Center. Bailey, who moved to the neighborhood in 1979, was honored for her selflessness and focus, which she demonstrated by leading VECA for three consecutive terms. The Mary Wilder Award went to McLean Baptist Church. The church is known as a gracious neighbor, and it shares facilities, resources and people with the neighborhood. In fact, the church shared its facilities for VECA's 2010 annual meeting!



A special guest at the meeting was council member
Myron Lowery, whose district includes the VECA area. He has been a long time supporter of VECA and frequently appears at VECA events.

After the food. laughter and awards, members voted to consolidate VECA and VECA CDC and then use the name Vollintine **Evergreen Community** Association (VECA) for the organization. 

Eddie is the first member of his parents' family to complete a college degree. Now age 42, he has been a barber for the Magic Clippers Barber Shop at 1572 Vollintine for the past 10 years. A graduate of Northside High School, Eddie completed his barber training at Jet Barber College in 1997. He started college studies at Southwest Tennessee Community College in 2005 and transferred to the University of Memphis in 2007.

He and his wife Marlo live at 926 North Willett St. Marlo Harper, a graduate of Mitchell High School and Christian Brothers University, has been teaching with the Shelby County Schools (Northaven Elementary School) for the past 5 years. Their family includes five children between the ages of seven and 20.



Eddie intends to continue running his barber shop and to become more active in community services in the VECA neighborhood. He also expects to do substitute teaching and eventually land a full-time teaching position in an area high school. He says that his community youth work revealed a strong need for children to have activities and responsible role models in their development.
