Beneficial V&E Greenline Project

The V&E Greenline has a beautiful property at 1625 Tutwiler of which we are all very proud. It includes the trail, a woodland path in a shade garden, a charming Stationhouse, a musical play station sculpture, and the grounds for the V&E Artwalk. However, the site has not been easily accessible because of several drainage ditches and a steep incline separating the Stationhouse from the trail.

The Hyde Family Foundations stepped in with a grant that funded a majority of construction costs of the V&E Greenline Stationhouse walkway. Hyde also funded a number of other projects on the V&E Greenline that were completed earlier this year. It was a pleasure to work with Lauren Taylor, Hyde Family Foundations program director for Livable Communities, who was very patient and supportive as we took our time to complete this very complicated project.

The walkway was designed by Ritchie Smith Associates, which did the impressive design work pro bono. Ritchie Smith did extensive landscape drawings and worked directly with a contractor to make the design come to life. He designed the project so it met the requirements of the Americans for Disability Act (ADA).

Since funding was not sufficient to complete the work, Keeler Ironworks – which built the two V&E Greenline bridges in earlier years – donated the rails for the stairs and handicapaccessible bank sidewalk. The rails will be completed as Keeler Ironworks has time to work on them.

Although not a part of the original plan, an attractive water fountain was added to the project; it includes a bubbler, bottle refill station, and a dog drinking dish. It was provided by the Tennessee Clean Water Network and funds were donated by V&E Greenline supporters:

Thank you, **Shelby County Greenprint**

The V&E Greenline trail has been cherished by many users, but the crossing streets lack crosswalks, warning signs to motorists, and handicapped-accessible entrances. Making these improvements is especially complicated because they are in the public right of way and the changes are governed by federal law and City of Memphis requirements. In December 2013, the V&E Greenline received a planning subgrant from the Shelby County Greenprint to plan these improvements. The Greenprint "is designed to enhance regional livability and sustainability by establishing a unified vision for a region-wide network of greenspace areas."


The subgrant has allowed the V&E Greenline to hire a landscape architect from Ritchie Smith Associates, who did technical studies and drawings at each of the street entrances to the trail. He assembled a team that included SR Consulting Engineers that developed final drawings for the entrances. These studies and drawings were submitted to the City of Memphis engineering department for approval. Once approved, significant funds will need to be raised for the actual construction. Ritchie Smith estimated the cost would be \$210,000, which could come from a combination of City transportation and storm water sources and federal sources.

A copy of the drawings is available at the VECA office. This project is not only a plan on how to develop the entrances, but it also provides detailed "shovel ready" technical drawings that can be used as soon as funding is available.

What would be different if this construction was done? A visit to the V&E Greenline crossing at McLean Boulevard shows what can be done. Along with the wide zebra-striped crosswalk already there, trail warning signs for motorists would be installed. The entrances would be made handicapped accessible, and sidewalks would be replaced. The changes would make the crossings safer, more accessible, easier to traverse, and much more attractive.



In Memoriam **Carl Johnson**

Carl Johnson, who operated Cave's Soul Food & More with his wife, Veronica, in the Vollintine Evergreen neighborhood, died September 1, 2014 from a heart attack. He was 51.

He was scheduled to have knee surgery the next day, and had decided to close the restaurant for all of September — for recuperation from the operation and for some welldeserved time off from the restaurant Carl (the CA) and Veronica (the VE) ran six days a week for almost four years.

Owning a restaurant was Carl's dream. He got the desire as a teenager, working at Gridley's. He started out cleaning at the barbecue restaurant, then worked up the ladder busboy, waiter, cook. He helped open the Gridley's restaurant on Macon in 1979. His love of barbecue manifested itself at Cave's when he put a pit out back of a laundromat at 1689 Jackson that was renovated into the restaurant.

Carl and Veronica put out excellent food: smoked chicken, ribs, astonishing burgers, and pot roast on Tuesdays. Best of all, you always felt at home at Cave's. Carl was a huge sports fan, most proud of the Dallas Cowboys and the Miami Heat, and always ready to talk

Carl will be missed by his many friends in Memphis.



Sewer Assessment Rehabilitation Program

The Sewer Assessment Rehabilatation Program is coming to Vollintine Evergreen this spring. Over the next ten years, the City of Memphis will be assessing the sanitary sewer lines in the neighborhoods of

Sanitary sewers that carry the waste from our homes (toilets, sinks, etc.) out to the sanitary lines deep in the streets to the two city treatment plants.

Vollintine Evergreen was built in the 1920s, and the sewer lines are from this time as well. The sanitary lines are almost 100 years old. Nothing



lasts forever, so Memphis, under an EPA Consent agreement, is looking for breaks and needed repairs. Breaks in sanitary lines can sometimes be the cause of sanitary sewer backups in basements during heavy rain. These are also referred to by the EPA as sanitary sewer overflows.


The testing will be done by various independent contractors. All trucks and workers should have their badges and logos displayed for all to see. The testing will be done using pressurized, oderless and harmless water vapor. Steam will be pumped into the lines to find breaks and leaks.

You will receive a notice on your door a week before the testing. The notice will provide you with contact information if you have questions. During the testing you may see steam coming up from your yard, out the drain in your tub, or out the vent stack on your roof. You may ask the workers any questions during this process.

If the steam appears in your yard, you may have a broken sanitary line. Talk to the workers for details. If the steam is in the street, the problem is with city lines.

This information was presented at the public meeting on basement backups (October 21).

The meeting was held at the VECA office. Bobby Allen from the City of Memphis Public Works and Michael Clay with Gresham Smith and Partners presented the program.



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Smart Phones Connect Neighbors, too!

If you haven't heard about Nextdoor yet, chances are, you'll hear about it soon. The "private social network" for neighborhoods is actively being used by the



Vollintine Evergreen Community and over 21,000 neighborhoods, and that number is growing every day. The Vollintine Evergreen neighborhood currently has 670 residents connected by using Nextdoor.

How does Nextdoor work? Neighbors create an account on Nextdoor and once their address is verified, they are connected to the other Vollintine Evergreen neighbors. Neighbors can then talk to each other about things going on in the neighborhood, whether that's exchanging recommendations on local service providers, like a contractor, a painter, a babysitter, or talking about local restaurants. People also use the site to talk about more personal things, like lost pets.

Crime and prevention is a frequent topic and Nextdoor is increasingly becoming like a virtual neighborhood watch for the neighborhood. Nextdoor enables everyone to participate in the conversations around crime and prevention even when they are unable to make it to a meeting

How much personal information do users have to reveal? Members are required to use their real name on their Nextdoor profile and the street that they live on. House numbers are optional. Nextdoor verifies addresses, and no one outside of the area can see your address.

Do you have to have a computer to use Nextdoor.com? Not at all. There is a Nextdoor app for Iphone and android phones. The app allows your smartphone to login and connect just as your would with a PC.

What are some success stories of using Nextdoor.com or nextdoor app? The biggest success has been communication for safety and security. Alerting neighbors of suspicious activity, break ins or criminal mischief. This is about being able to share information with your neighbors easily and quickly. Nextdoor is not a replacement for the police. It's about giving neighbors an easy way to communicate with one another so that you basically have more eyes on the street, and more neighbors looking out for each other and for each other's homes.

Technology is helping people become more connected. One criticism is, why do we need to use technology to get to know the people who live right outside our front door? Why don't people just go meet their neighbors? Oftentime, people just don't. They're busy. Nextdoor can be an ice breaker to get the conversation going in the neighborhood. Nextdoor lends itself to bringing people together in real life and helping to create real-world relationships.












Neighbor Highlight Meet Nancy Morrow

Before stepping into the brightly colored home of Nancy Murrow, one can tell she has a lively personality from her vivacious garden and the blue and purple color trim of her

Nancy's front garden bursts with color in summer months. Nancy is a paralegal during

the week, but her true passion is plants, specifically terrariums. She grew up around plants; her family's garden occupied many of her childhood hours.

Nancy wanted to start a business she could carry over into retirement. She chose terrariums, due to their growing popularity and simplistic beauty.

Terrariums require a certain structure for the plants to thrive. Rocks or pebbles on the bottom provide drainage. Active carbon adds sweetness to the soil (a special mixture with low nutrients). A layer of dried sphagnum moss traps the water, and a final layer of soil controls the moisture in the tank to prevent mold. There is a delicate balance between too much moisture and not enough.

Nancy's focus on terrariums arose from her experience dealing with people who knew little about the plants they were buying. Large companies sell plants without instructing their customers how to care for them. You could call Nancy the plant rescuer! Her ability to educate is so important in the joy she brings to gardeners. People call Nancy for advice and she is always happy to share her expertise. She even started a network of people to promote plant education and spread awareness.

Terrariums are low maintenance, and they allow exotic plants to grow in an otherwise-hostile home environment. They thrive best in bright light but not direct sunlight. To prevent overgrowth and keep the plants small, you have to deprive them of resources.

Nancy sells them at Diane's Art Gift and Home on Overton Park Avenue, and Five In One on Broad Street. In the past Nancy has held a how-to terrarium class there,

It takes months for the terrarium to be complete and ready to sell, a slow road to "living art." But what an amazing gift to be able to create something unique.

Conference Overview

On a beautiful Saturday morning on October 25, VECA welcomed District Attorney Amy Weirich, Environmental Court Judge Larry Potter, and Community Resource Coordinator Toni Hayes. These leaders shared with community members an overview of their jobs and what they are currently working on to ensure communities like ours stay safe.

District Attorney Weirich welcomed an intimate crowd with a warm smile and introduction. She has been a prosecutor for 23 years. The district attorney's office is made up of 210 employees, 106 of whom are attorneys, making it one of the largest D.A.'s office in the country. A newly designed system consisting of five vertical units has been developed in the past few years to ensure that cases are assigned to the same prosecutor throughout the procedure. This design is intended to minimize the number of times that victims have to repeat their stories. The combined units include: Domestic Violence; DUI Task Force; Gang and Narcotics; Public Corruption and Economic Crimes; Special Prosecution; and Special Victims.

Weirich is also in charge of a juvenile court staff that handles cases from truancy to murder. A child is considered truant after five days of unexcused school absences. Programs have been established to reduce the rate of truancy within Memphis. Eleven schools have participated in a reward program that donates new bikes at the end of the school year to children with good attendance. Last May 303 bikes were given to children through the Hyde Family Foundations.

Judge Larry Potter started working in the city court in 1978. In 1982 he applied for a vacancy on civil court; he was appointed to establish an Environmental Court. At the time, there were only two other environmental courts in the country. In 1991, environmental laws were passed giving the court injunctive authority to deal with such problems.

Nuisance and environmental laws were passed to keep Memphis and Shelby County clean and safe. Tall weeds, broken windows, junked cars, cars parked on yards, trash, and debris all diminish the quality of life. As Potter said, "As long as the way you're using your property

does not interfere with the enjoyment of your neighbors' property, all is well. Since that is somewhat subjective, laws and interpretations of the laws are left to environmental court."

Toni Hayes works for the City of Memphis Office of Community Affairs as Community Resource Coordinator. Hayes serves Vollintine Evergreen as a liaison to the City of Memphis. The office offers a community neighborhood leadership training program, and many other programs to engage neighbors in their community. The office works with everything from crime, blight, beautification and National

They show me their report cards and their progress reports. They come down here to show me and papers go flying everywhere.

Citizens have been reporting on the NextDoor about what seemed to be an inordinate number of burglaries in Vollintine Evergreen. Mary Wilder organized a meeting at the VECA Welcome Center to talk about the problem.

The meeting was a great success. There were 23 residents, five police officials, and four VECA volunteers who discussed the problem dispassionately with the goal of solving the problem. The crime areas seemed to be northeast of Tutwiler Avenue and McLean, north of the Tutwiler and Dickinson area and Rainbow Circle. The police have identified 25 burglaries and have made five arrests. Four of those arrested were juveniles. Officers have been patrolling the area heavily, sending in undercover operations, and looking at police reports for crime

Residents at the meeting talked about their concerns and gave police the specifics of the burglaries at their homes. They asked great questions about securing their homes and the police responded that watching each other's houses was important, along with taking a number of safety actions, such as making houses look as secure as possible. Residents who are traveling out of town should not advertise their absence by leaving newspapers on the lawn and garbage cans at the curb. People can also call the Crump Station for a vacation patrol. The police cautioned against placing Christmas boxes from expensive items on the curb, since that alerts criminals that expensive items are in that house.

Police officials said they solve 70 percent of the burglaries as the result of calls and tips from residents. They also said burglar alarms were especially effective and video cameras were helpful in identifying the criminals.

Mostly the police asked residents to call them if suspicious people are on the street. They encouraged using the police dispatch number, but if it's difficult to get through on that line, use 911 or even call the Crump Station Precinct.

One of the more interesting suggestions was to have clean alleys. Police reported that often burglars had entered through alleys. Police like to drive through alleys but cannot if they are overgrown or blocked. Helping to keep your alleys clear can reduce crime in the neighborhood!



Police said that juveniles committing burglaries were being released from the courts because of the recent U.S. Department of Justice settlement, and said state law prohibits their access to juvenile fingerprints. They also mentioned the shortage of officers because of resignations and retirements, and said it was difficult to put officers everywhere citizens

The meeting was a huge success -- thanks to everyone who attended.


